Al: Using Music and Movement to Build Resilience, Self-Regulation, and the Brain in Young Children

Music and movement are a form of active learning. They are play-based and can be designed to be developmentally appropriate, facilitating not just learning, but also development, within the four cornerstones of child development. Come have fun learning movements that will help children learn to self-regulate, build confidence and self-esteem, and facilitate cognitive, physical, and social-emotional development and enhance literacy. By using their bodies in ways that encourage the left and right sides of the brain to work together, children not only build better bodies and brains, they also gain control over their bodies and emotions and build resilience, leaving them better equipped to deal with challenging situations and bounce back faster and easier. This means smoother classroom management with less incidents of acting out. Wear comfortable clothing and shoes, and be prepared to move and have fun!
