Keynote Speaker: Jillian Best Adler

Jillian Best Adler is an early childhood consultant. She holds a master's degree in child development from the Erikson Institute and has spent most of her career training and coaching early childhood educators and facilitating workshops and support groups for parents. Using a nonjudgmental, laughs-are-welcome-here approach, she guides educators and parents through the process of shifting their perspectives on everyday behaviors and commonly held beliefs about children and our interactions with them. All of her work, including her own parenting, is values-based and informed by/rooted in a commitment to justice.

"The parents don't trust us anymore!" "That young teacher has no work ethic!" "Parents just don't discipline their kids. They don't care!"

A2: Managing Challenging Behaviors in the Classroom

What drives children's "bad" behavior? Learn to uncover the hidden factors and root causes of common misbehaviors. Use brain science and compassion to understand and solve children's behavioral challenges with a trauma-informed lens. A3: Successful Strategies for Communication and Collaboration with Parents

Working with the families of the children you serve can be trying, but it's very important for the child's success. This workshop will cover strategies that child care programs and teachers can use to build relationships with the families they serve. We will discuss how you can communicate your expectations of the families you serve and their expectations of you, as well as how to approach concerns as they arise. When relationships are built and expectations are communicated, working with families can be less stressful and a stronger community is developed.
