### Resources



December is Safe Toys & Gifts Month, which is a reminder of the importance of choosing toys and gifts that meet safety standards and are developmentally appropriate. The goal is to prevent accidents and injuries from toys that aren't safe or appropriate for a child's age or developmental stage.

Some suggestions for selecting safe toys and gifts include: (1) Check labels for manufacturer's recommendations and make sure the toy passed a safety inspection; (2) Avoid small parts (including magnets and "button" batteries) that can be choking hazards for young children; (3) Check for hazards such as sharp edges or loose parts; (4) Consider children's age, interests, and abilities; and (5) Choose educational toys and gifts that encourage learning, creativity, and development.

# Holiday Gift Giving



Holiday preparation includes decorating, cooking, shopping...the list goes on! But to give children a magical holiday experience, there's no need to stress or break the bank, especially when it comes to gift-giving.

Here is a basic gift guideline. Keep in mind the child's specific cognitive, emotional, and physical abilities:

- Infants (0-1 year): Soft toys, teething rings, simple rattles, large colorful objects.
- Toddlers (1–3 years): Push/pull toys, building blocks, simple puzzles, picture books.
- Preschoolers (3-5 years): Dress-up sets, arts and crafts, beginner games, dolls/action figures.

Think about what will excite them. Each child is unique, so anything personalized is sure to be a hit. Use their favorite TV show, movie character, hobbies, or extracurricular activity as a guide.

When possible, try to incorporate an educational element. For instance, if your child loves nature, a science kit to explore plants and insects would be fun and intellectually stimulating. Choosing a gift that will encourage outdoor or active play is a great idea. A bicycle, soccer ball, or swimming lessons will contribute to an active lifestyle, as well as promote social interaction and teamwork.

If you are keeping costs low this year, take advantage of the opportunity to teach children the difference between needs and wants with practical gifts, like a new pair of shoes or a set of books at their reading level.

Lastly, don't dismiss quality time, as it is always appreciated and appropriate! Get creative during those chilly winter evenings with a living room camp-out, put on a play, or go on a flashlight scavenger hunt. These experiences create memories that will last longer than anything you can buy in a store.


